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How are the scores used?	If students take the Writing test, they will receive a combined English/Writing score along with their Writing subscore; the English test score is weighted as two-thirds and the Writing test score is weighted as one-third of the total combined score	The redesigned SAT reports more scores than before. New to the SAT, the two cross-test scores and seven new subscores indicate how students tested in specific skill and knowledge areas
	National Ranks: Show percent of recent high school graduates who took the ACT and scored at or below the students' scores	All other exams in the suite (e.g., PSAT 8/9, PSAT/NMSQT) share the same score scale so the students' progress can be monitored across grades by the students themselves or educators through high school
	"Planning Your Education and Career" section helps students explore college majors and occupations specific to them  See Your ACT Test Scores – Viewing, Sending, and Understanding Scores for more information	Students' scores will be reported with content-based interpretations of student performance
